Our wellbeing team including our SSO Felicity, our counsellor Eddy and our social work students Joanna and Austin were amazing in their support of our community. Parent forum, surveys, wellbeing lesson, performances, student support, agency connection, kindness, care and compassion. They did whatever needed doing often before we even knew it was required. The wonderful administration team kept the ship sailing full steam ahead. Soula and Jamel collected food donations from the Woolworths food rescue program and got



them out to our families. They supported families with funding applications and were on the phone from sun up to sun down. They made things happen during lockdown to ensure the school was ready and resourced for our return. The support they provided to me to ensure we could run the school remotely was incredible.

The executive team looked after everyone, me included. They were online with classes, supporting teachers with curriculum and behaviour management, finding creative ways to carry out their school plan responsibilities, planning for an EPIC 2022, meeting with parents, carers and agencies. I threw new challenges at them daily and they never said no. They constantly take my expectations and rise far, far above them. They define excellence.

This inspirational team of professionals did all this while caring for their own families, supporting their own children with online learning, while navigating their own struggles with lockdown and the world. I couldn't be prouder of each and every one of them nor could I be more grateful for their unwavering support of all things Verona.

INTSTRUCTIONAL LEADER'S REPORT



I would like to start my Assistant Principals by welcoming everyone back after the disruption of the Covid Lockdown. The students have taken the change and disruption in their stride and have settled well back into school routine, an effort for which they should be congratulated.

Due to the disruption of this term and Covid restrictions around the movement of people, Verona has temporarily suspended integration for the majority of our cohort attending their homeschool's on a Thursday. This is only an interim measure, and we are planning on resumption of integration in term 1, 2022. 
















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
